
The fantastic growth of the broadcast and publication work brought many cast and publication work brought many changes in our filing and mailing departments during 1960. Increase in *The Plain Truth* circulation to more than 300,000 copies has forced us to install the same type of mailing equipment used by such mass-circulation magazines as *LIFE*, Saturday Evening Post, Ladies Home Journal. The integration of a new I.B.M. electronic, punch-card file system (tar right) tronic, punch-card file system (far right) will enable us to give better service than ever to a rapidly growing list of subscribers.

Using a photo-electrically addressed tape, the high-speed addressing machine (above) addresses 18,000 Plain Truths per hour. An estimated 4,000,000 will be sent to Everywhere, U.S.A. in 1961.











Acknowledgments
